An interesting coincidence this year, as February 14th is both Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday. Valentine's Day is one of the country's most popular holidays. Stores put out candy boxes and romantic cards, while restaurants and hotels advertise romantic packages for couples looking for a special way to spend the day. And in case you were wondering, you don't need to be in a relationship to celebrate the holiday. There are plenty of options for friends and family members looking to display their affection as well.

The holiday goes back to the third century when the Roman Empire ruled the world. During this time there were two saints named Valentine who performed heroic acts that made them martyrs within the Christian religion. They were both beheaded by the Romans, one for performing



illegal marriages of young couples and the other for preaching Christianity before it was legal. The name "Valentine's Day" probably comes from one or both of them.

It is also said that the date February 14 derives from a Roman holiday to honor Juno, the goddess of marriage. The celebration included a feast to celebrate health and fertility, both because spring was coming and the Romans wanted their plants to grow and also because of human fertility. Once the Romans lost power and Christianity grew in popularity, February 14, now called Valentine's Day, was celebrated. In the Middle Ages, people believed this was the date that birds chose their mates. They believed in England that if you met or dreamed about someone on this day, they could be your true love.

Other Valentine's Day traditions evolved over time. In the 1600s, in England and other parts of Western Europe, the custom came of sending romantic messages to one's beloved. In the late 1800s, the holiday was also commercialized, with businesses printing and selling pre-written Valentine's messages. Around that time, people started giving candy and flowers to loved ones or going on romantic getaways with their partners. It really hasn't changed much since.


But, let us go back before the third and fourth centuries to 'the years of our Lord', when Jesus, the Christ, so loved the world that he gave his own life for the salvation of all. He proclaimed and exemplified by his own life that "LOVE" was the essence and key to having a good and fulfilling life, eventually leading to eternal life with our Lord.

Today, Ash Wednesday ushers in that period of time (the Lenten Season) when Christians remember the events leading up to the greatest sacrificial love of all time, eventually leading to the death and resurrection of Jesus, whose teachings are the foundation of our faith and our assurance of eternal life if we truly believe.

#### **MOVIES WITH SPIRIT**

#### Feb. 24, STRANGERS IN GOOD COMPANY (1990), Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church, 22 Livingston

St., Kingston — This charming drama from Cynthia Scott centers on eight elderly women from the United States, Canada and Britain who don't know each other but find themselves suddenly depending on each other when they get stranded in the rural Canadian countryside. Traveling on a sightseeing trip through a largely uninhabited area, the women's tour bus breaks down and, as they await help, they are forced to fend for themselves. Finding refuge in an empty farmhouse, the mostly elderly women listen to birds, make drawings, enjoy the scenery and eventually form an indelible bond as they start talking and sharing many of their very disparate life experiences and memories. The women also catch fish using pantyhose for nets. The only young woman is the bus driver (Michelle Sweeney), who is also a jazz singer. To create an air of reality and sponta-



neity, director Scott used nonprofessional actors and encouraged them to draw on their lives and improvise dialogue. The women range in background from a Mohawk matriarch (Alice Diabo) and a respected U.S. feminist writer and painter (Mary Meigs) to a nun with a working knowledge of mechanics (Sister Catherine Roche). The film, also called *The Company of Strangers*, earned four film-festival awards, including the Grand Prize at Germany's Mannheim—Heidelberg International Film Festival. "A beautifully unique work, both in its topic and its docufiction execution . . . celebrating the lives of these eight women and the experience of being together without the influences of men — or the outside world." — Amelie Lasker, The Hot Pink Pen. "Their souls sparkle with surprising inner beauty." — Frederic and Mary Ann Brussat, Spirituality and Practice. "Feels less like a drama than a vacation." — Janet Maslin, The New York Times. #### Stewardship Moment

#### Day 4 – The Lord watches your generosity.

#### 2 Corinthians 8:12

For the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have.

People are often grouped as "glass half-full" people or "glass half-empty" people. The glass half-full people are the optimists, always seeing what is good about a situation. The glass half-empty people are the pessimists, the ones who, instead of seeing what is good, only see what is wrong or missing. When God looks at your generosity, how does He see your glass? Do you think He looks at all the ways you could have done more or could have done better?

Many people experience huge amounts of guilt and anxiety because they don't think they are doing enough for God. They fear He isn't happy with them. But, the Scriptures tell us that God looks at the offerings His children bring graciously and generously. When a child makes a drawing for a parent, they come and say, "Look what I made you! All you may see are a bunch of squiggly lines of crayon; but, when told it is a picture of the two of you playing outside, or a pony, or a million different things, no parent looks at the child and says, "Well this is sure a poor drawing; but, I guess I'll take it." Rather, because that picture is from your own child, it is cherished. And the next thing you know, you have a refrigerator covered with drawings that only look vaguely like what they are supposed to be.

Likewise, when God's children bring an offering to God made in love and eagerness, 2 Corinthians 8:12 says that God is well pleased with that offering. He doesn't judge His children according to all the things they never were or never accomplished. Rather, because they are His own spiritual children He receives the offering they bring.

If you are one of God's redeemed children, live generously toward God, in ways both large and small, and know that God is pleased by that action.

#### Today's Generosity Challenge:

Today is a two-part challenge; first prayerfully consider how you can do something for someone that is small; but, meaningful. Then, pray for something really sacrificial, something big that will cost you. Now, ask the Lord to present total strangers before you that you can live generously for them with these two challenges. Then tonight, before you go to bed, write down your observations and how your generosity was received. Journal your challenge here at http://GenerousLife.net/Day4. As your eyes close, ask the Lord to remind you of His generosity towards you, in the big things and the small things.


